

PEARL SONG

for solo flute

by Robert G. Patterson
(1984)

Performance Notes:

1. This piece requires a flute with a low $b\flat^0$ extension to play both the penultimate note and the $f\sharp^2$ harmonics beginning at the final *meno mosso*.
2. The notes marked “loh” should be articulated with that syllable in the context of an otherwise slurred line.
3. Because of the harmonic on the final $a\flat^3$, a slight break across the barline is permissible.
4. Perform the notes marked “ht.” as follows. Finger the pitch indicated by the x-shaped notehead and rotate the mouthpiece around so that you can force your tongue abruptly into the blowhole. Using a “ht.” attack, create a percussive sound whose resultant pitch is the pitch notated by the small notehead.
5. X-shaped noteheads without the “ht.” marking indicate key clicks.
